Reflection for the Fourth Sunday of Advent

The fourth Sunday of Advent focuses on the "Lord of peace" who came to us in the form of a baby through his mother Mary.

Mary, did you know?

Mary, did you know all that your baby boy would do and be?

When Mary was visited by the angel Gabriel, her faith was breathtakingly bright and strong as she responded after only a few questions:

"Behold I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done according to your will."

Mary's peace with what God asks of her is inspiring. Her acceptance of an uncertain future as the mother of Jesus is for us a strong example of belief in God. Mary does not fear: she relies on her faith as she prepares for Christ's birth. She does not complain; she lives, she loves, she waits with grace.
