Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In the year 1995, in the seventeenth year of my life, when Fife Symington was governor of Arizona, Bill Clinton was president of the United States, Chuck Keiffer was pastor of St. Theresa parish in Phoenix, Arizona, and Ron and Mary were my parents, the word of God came to my youth minister Eric and through him I started to see the salvation of God. Soon, Christ came into my life never to leave. I'm thankful beyond words.

Why am I being so specific, you ask? Because in the Gospel this week we hear the specific names of people holding civic and religious authority in first century Palestine when "the word of God came to John the Baptist:" Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate, Herod, Philip, Lysanias, Annas, Caiaphas, and Zechariah. All this is meant to help us see that God breaks into our history, into real human events. Jesus is no mere myth. He is the Word-which-breaks-in, in concrete moments, you might say. And now we anticipate his coming once again in our specific situations.

Advent challenge: Name as many civic and religious leaders who are in authority currently in your life. Now, name who the potential John the Baptists may be. A spouse? A friend? A podcaster? A work colleague who brings God's word to you? Spend a moment considering that this comprises the concrete, historical setting into which Christ wishes to come. Then, with these specifics in mind, pray: "Come, Lord Jesus. Come."



Support women and children experiencing homelessness.

Christ Church Episcopal Cathedral (CCC), in partnership with Uniting Partners (UP) for Women and Children, will begin a pilot program in January called Room in the Inn - Louisville. Each night of January and February 2025, CCC will open its Dean's Hall space to house 15 women and their minor children

The pilot program is modeled on Nashville's successful Room in the Inn program, which was started by Fr. Charles Strobel, pastor of Holy Name Catholic Church. During a particularly cold winter night in 1985, Fr. Strobel opened the church to several unhoused neighbors sleeping nearby in their cars.

Animated by that spirit, we envision opening up a space on our campus each night in January and February 2025, to 15 women (and their minor children, as necessary). From intake at 6pm to departure at 6:30am the next morning, shelter guests will be welcomed into the Cathedral space for dinner, a time of quiet relaxation, and peaceful sleep before departing after breakfast.

The shelter will be staffed by volunteers - at least two at all times - during the hours between 5pm and 7 am. They will assist in welcoming the shelter's guests, making and serving dinner and breakfast, ensuring that the evening's program proceeds smoothly, that everyone makes it to bed and wakes up on time, and providing cleanup after departure in the morning. Volunteer orientation and training will be provided by Cathedral and UP staff.

UP for Women and Children, Louisville's only day shelter for women, female-identifying individuals, and their minor children, has rented space on the Cathedral's campus since 2017. UP is a crucial community partner who will provide guidance and logistical support for this pilot program. UP will handle the pre-screening and intake responsibilities for Winter Shelter along with technical assistance.

St. Frances of Rome and St. Leonard parishioners are invited to attend an information session at SFR on Monday, December 9 beginning at 6pm inside the Holy Trinity Clifton Campus Reception Hall.

Learn how we can volunteer to ensure mothers, and their children have a safe and warm place to spend the night in the coldest months of the year.
