Supporting Families Alongside Holy Trinity's SVdP Conference

Several years ago, I was working at another Louisville Catholic parish when a mother stopped by the office asking if we had any laundry detergent she could have or perhaps a gift card to Kroger so that she could buy some. She and her husband had both been laid off from their jobs recently, and she didn't have any money to buy detergent.

She cried as she told me that her children had gone to school all week in dirty clothes and were being made fun of by their classmates. My heart was breaking for her.

That's a scenario that is all too common for our low-income neighbors. Benefits like SNAP can only be used for food expenses, so things like laundry detergent and dish soap are often luxuries. Some of our neighbors rely on local organizations like the food and supply pantries at the St Vincent de Paul (SVdP) Campus downtown. The Holy Trinity SVdP Conference provides both monetary support and volunteers for this vital pantry. We have the opportunity to combine our efforts with theirs to meet the needs of our community.

For the month of August, St. Frances of Rome is going to focus on filling the shelves at the pantry with dish soap (like Dawn or Palmolive) and laundry detergent. Look for the empty boxes sitting in the back of church over the next few weeks. Let's make sure they are all filled with our donations to re-stock the SVdP shelves. We can ensure that our Louisville neighbors have what they need for a dignified life for themselves and their children.



Fall Adult Formation to Begin August 26/27

Our 2025-26 adult faith formation year will begin with a new book from Little Rock Scripture Studies: *Encountering the God of Faith, Hope, and Love in the Bible* by Fr. George Smiga. This text will be an easy introduction to Bible study for everyone. If you've been considering joining us, this is a great opportunity.

Faith, hope, and love are three vital dimensions of our life with God. Faith is entering into and clinging to a relationship with God. Hope is what we expect from that relationship. And love—the greatest of these—is the very essence of the relationship itself. In *Encountering the God of Faith, Hope, and Love in the Bible*, award-winning Scripture commentator Fr. George Smiga explores how God is

revealed through various stages of salvation history—from the call of Abraham through the resurrection of Jesus—and how faith, hope, and love have evolved as our understanding of God grows.

This book is set to be published and shipped by August 15. St. Frances of Rome has pre-ordered 50 copies, so watch for a sign up sheet in the back of church next week. As soon as books are available, you will receive an email letting you know when/where to pick up your copy.

If there are any delays in shipping from the publisher, we may have to delay our start date until the first week of September.



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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Recent studies suggest that millennials will be the first generation in America to be worse off than their parents in terms of financial earnings and job status. Many lament this. I propose that this week's Gospel provides a hopeful way to see the trend as good news.

The Lord Jesus says, "Take care to guard against greed, for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist in possessions" (Luke 12:15). Greed damages us with the deception that we are what we possess. But to Jesus, this is simply not true. What makes us happy is who we are, who we become.

Does not the expectation that every generation should do better than their parents subtly mask the poison of greed? A similar attitude is mirrored in the man who demands that Jesus justly arrange his share of the family inheritance. Despite the injustice, Jesus will not play that game. In fact, he seems to prefer that the man have less than his parents. What good would having more be to this man if he becomes enslaved and miserable by greed? What good would it be for us to have more if it means we become much less?

In allowing the man to have less, Jesus opens a space for him to become more: a man free to love. In that much more meaningful sense, perhaps he was better off than his parents. Maybe the millennials will be, too.



Gospel:


Jesus tells the crowds the parable of the rich fool, warning against excessive material wealth. How do you balance your material needs with "what matters to God"?
